



Ozone layer is recovering as damaging chemicals phased out

Scientist first identified a hole in the ozone layer, which helps filter out ultraviolet rays from the sun in 1985.

The earth's protective layer is on the track to recover within four decades as damaging airborne chemicals are phased out helping to shield humans from the sun ray's and limit global warming, an UN-backed scientific panel said. A rare international agreement was reached in 1987 to phase out gases, including chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs), which were used in products such as air conditioners, refrigerators and deodorants but were breaking down ozone in the upper atmosphere. A 2016 update to the so-called Montreal Protocol also phased out hydrofluorocarbons (HFCs), which do not directly deplete ozone but have a strong climate change effect. Since the chemicals were banned, there has been a "notable recovery" in the upper layer of the stratosphere, according to the report by the Scientific Assessment Panel to the Montreal Protocol, which is updated every four years. The HFC phase-out has also avoided in estimated 0.5C warming by 2100.

If current policies remain in place, the ozone layer is expected to recover to 1980 levels- before the appearance of the hole-by around 2066 over the Atlantic, by 2045 over the Antarctic, has been shrinking in area and depth since the year 2000, the report said. However, proposals to use geoengineering in the atmosphere to reduce global warming by reflecting more sunlight into space could have unintended consequences, including delaying ozone recovery, the report warns Other factors, including rocket launches, more frequent intense wildfires exacerbated by climate change, could also delay the recovery, and more research is needed to understand how much, it added.

THE NEW EDUCATION POLICY, 2020

Introduction:

Education is the most powerful tool for achieving all-round human development, developing an equitable society, and promoting socio-economic development of the country. Universal access to high-quality education is the key factor to achieve various goal such as economic growth, social justice and equality, national integration, scientific advancement and rich cultural preservation.

The New Education Policy was announced by the MHRD in 2020 which proposed various reforms in school education as well as in higher and technical education. The NEP has mentioned a number of activities and programmes to be implemented in school education and also in higher and technical education. The Sustainable Development Goal 4 (SDG4) adopted by India in 2015 seeks to "ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all" by 2030. If the entire education system is reconfigured and restructured, all targets and goals of SDGs can be achieved.


Previous Policies:

The first National policy on Education announced in 1986 and subsequently modified in 1992 has focused largely on issues of access and equity in education. Since 1986, enactment of the Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act 2009 was a major development for achieving universal elementary education. The unfinished agenda of NPE 1986 is appropriately dealt with in this NEP of 2020.

Salient Features of NEP:

The salient features of the NEP are summarized as under:

 The NEP proposed to ensure Universal Access at all levels of schooling right from perprimary school to Grade 12th. Education is also to be provided for all children between 3-6 years.



- 6. Special emphasis is to be placed on Socially and Economically Disadvantaged Groups (SEDGs) to achieve the goal of equitable and inclusive education.
- 7. It is recommended to set up a separate Gender Inclusion Fund and Special Education Zones for disadvantaged groups and regions.
- 8. Merit based performance and a robust and transparent processes will be adopted for recruitment of teachers.
- 9. The availability of all resources must get ensured through school complexes and clusters.
- 10. Setting up of State School Standard Authority (SSSA).
- 11. Exposure to be given to vocational education both in school and higher education system.
- 12. Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER) to be increased in higher education to 50%. Expansion of open and distance learning is important to increase Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER).
- 13. Holistic and multidisciplinary Education would be provided with multiple entry and exit options.
- 14. National Testing Agency (NTA) has to offer Common Entrance Exam for admission to HEIs.
- 15. It is proposed to establish Academic Bank of credit for students.
- 16. Multidisciplinary Education and Research Universities (MERUs) will be set up.
- 17. The National Research Foundation (NRF) is to be set up.
- 18. Internationalization of Education is suggested.
- 19. Professional Education will be an integral part of the higher education system. The aim of technical, health science, legal and agricultural universities or institutions is to become multi-disciplinary institutions.
- 20. The duration of Teacher Education would be 4 years integrated stage-specific, and subject-specific Bachelor of Education.
- 21. The policy aims to achieve 100% youth and adult literacy.
- 22. Commercialization of higher education will be combat and stopped by introducing multiple mechanisms with checks and balances.
- 23. All education institutions will have similar standards of audit and disclosure as a 'not for profit' entity.
- 24. The Centre and States have to work together to enhance the public investment in education sector to reach 6% of GDP at the earliest from the present 3.2% of GDSP.
- 25. Strengthening of the Central Advisory Board of Education to ensure coordination to bring overall focus on quality education.
- 26. The Higher Education Commission of India (HECI) would be set up as a single overarching umbrella body for promotion of higher education sector excluding medical and legal education. The proposed independent bodies of HECI are: (1) The General Education Council (GEC) foe standard setting, (2) The Higher Education Grants Council (HEGC) for funding of higher education, (3) The National Accreditation Council (NAC) for accreditation of HEIs, and, (\$) The National Higher Education Regulatory Council (NHERC) for regulation of higher education. The policy of 'Light but Tight' regulation will be followed.
- 27. Creation of National Educational Technology Forum (NETF) as an autonomous body to provide a platform for the free exchange of ideas on the use of technology to enhance planning, administration learning, assessment, and appropriate integration of technology into all levels of education.

28. Establishment of a National Mission for Mentoring (NMM) and the national mission on Foundational literacy and numeracy (NMFLN).

The NEP 2020 aims to increase the GER to 100% in pre-school to secondary level by 2030, and GER in higher education from 26.3% in 2018 to 50% by 2035.

The Central Sector Scheme Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya National Mission on Teachers and Teaching (PMMMNMTT) was launched in 2014 to address comprehensively all issues related to teacher training, capacity building and professional development of teachers. About 95 centers were set up in the country through which teachers have been trained. After appraisal, the Standing Finance Committee has recommended for continuation of this scheme till 2025-26.

Conclusion:

The New Education policy 2020 is the first education policy to address many problems faced by the prevailing education system. The main aim of the policy is to promote universal and equitable access to the highest-quality education for all irrespective of social, economic and cultural backgrounds. The policy proposed major reforms in the existing school and higher education system to bring out the highest quality, equity, justice, and integrity in education. It has proposed complete revision and revamping of all aspects of the education system including its structure, regulation and governance.

In a nutshell, the NEP would make education more experiential, holistic, integrated, inquiry-driven, discovery-oriented, learner-centred, discussion-based, flexible, problem - solving, creative, innovative, skill and knowledge-based, and multidisciplinary.

How to improve communication skills?


"Good communication is the bridge between CONFUSION and CLARITY."

Do you know In India 86% people lack effective communication skills. It is essential for people to understand that in order to become a good communicator, fluency is a very important factor. Not only fluency but also the kinds of words that one uses, the way in which one conducts their tone are some of the most important things that contribute to make someone a very good speaker of English. Another key factor that is observed and is used to judge someone's speaking skills is their grammar. If someone has the correct idea of how to use the correct grammar in their sentences, then their speaking will have a much better impact than someone who does not have this. Therefore basic grammatical skills is something that is needed among every single person trying to speak well. I went from poor communicator to a good communicator just by making sure of few

points. I couldn't believe how simple it was. I'll tell you the main points so that you don't have to waste a day.

1. Listening

Being a good listener is one of the best ways to be a good communicator. No one likes communicating with someone who only cares about putting in her two cents and does not take the time to listen to the other person. If you are a good listener, you can understand and respond well to the person.



2. Nonverbal Communication

Your body language, eye contact, hand gestures, and tone all color the message you are trying to convey. A relaxed, open stance (arms open, legs relaxed), and a friendly tone will make you appear approachable, and will encourage others to speak openly with you. Eye contact is also important; you have to look at the person in the eye to demonstrate that you are focused on the person and the conversation (however, be sure not to stare at the person, which can make him or her uncomfortable).

3. Clarity and Concision

Good communication means saying just enough — don't talk too much or too little. Try to convey your message in as few words as possible. Say what you want clearly and directly, whether you're speaking to someone in person, on the phone, or via email. If you ramble on, your listener will either tune you out or will be unsure of exactly what you want. Think about what you want to say before you say it; this will help you to avoid talking excessively and/or confusing your audience.

4. Open-Mindedness

A good communicator should enter any conversation with a flexible, open mind. Be open to listening to and understanding the other person's point of view, rather than simply getting your message across. By being willing to enter into a dialogue, even with people with whom you disagree, you will be able to have more honest, productive conversations.

5. Confidence

It is important to be confident in your interactions with others. Confidence shows your listeners that you believe in what you're saying and will follow through. Exuding confidence can be as simple as making eye contact or using a firm but friendly tone. Avoid making statements sound like questions. Of course, be careful not to sound arrogant or aggressive.

To conclude I feel the art of communication is the language of leadership, this article will help you

all to polish your daily communication skills.

Competency-Based and commitment Oriented Teacher Education for Quality School Education

Teacher education is the heart of any educational system. If we want to improve the educational system, we will have to improve the teaching and Teacher Education System. During the last 3-4 decades, there had been a number of innovations in the field of teaching and Teacher Education. The quality and tone of the school and the institutions of teacher education are dependent to a large extent on the quality of teaching and teacher education, incorporating the innovations made in this field.

To improve the teacher education system in the country, the National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE), which sets norms and standards for quality teacher education and ensures planned and coordinated development of teacher education, is conducting a nationwide study on the demand and supply of teachers and teacher educators at the school level, for the years 2007-08 to 2016-17. Also, to upgrade the B.Ed. curriculum and other teacher-training programs, a revised National Curriculum Framework for Teacher Education (NCFTE) in harmonization with the NCF 2005 is being finalized by the NCTE.

The role of teacher education as a process of nation-building is universally recognized. But teacher education in India, because of its history and also due to various factors beyond its control, has by and large been confined to school education only. The educational expansion, universalization of elementary education, vocationalisation of secondary education, higher and professional education, and overall quality of education are major challenges before the country.

Evidently, the quality of education is a direct consequence and outcome of the quality of teachers and the teacher education system. The task of bringing qualitative change in the institutional efficacy of the teacher education system in itself is a huge and challenging one. The developments and changes over the last two decades require a fresh look at teacher education. The need for


improved levels of educational participation for overall progress is well recognized.

An online teacher education portal with the Centre for Development of Advanced Computing (C-DAC) is also on the cards. "The portal would address all stakeholders involved in teacher education, for example, teachers, aspirants, and teacher-educators, among others.

The educational system in the country is rapidly undergoing transformation. New textbooks and textual material are being prepared; school curricula in all the states are being revised. The country is going to have living laboratories for every kind of child; gifted, talented, disadvantaged, etc. Teacher educators have to get involved in this program. The teacher educator will meet with a situation where there is a mixture of children coming from different socio-economic strata.

The role of teachers is now changing as counselors, tutors, mentors, facilitators, diagnosticians, discussion leaders, classroom managers, etc. NCTE has very recently (August 1998) published another 'framework', which perhaps may receive greater attention in the field.

But what really has caught the imagination of the field is an earlier NCTE publication (January 1998,2009), viz., "competency Based and commitment Oriented Teacher Education for Quality School Education".



This is a unique document in the sense that it, for the first time in our country, discusses all three aspects of teacher education, i.e. cognitive, affective, and psychomotor. Traditionally, performance has occupied the pride of place. It is for the first time that all the domains are getting equal importance in a discussion on teacher education. The cognitive domain gets its due under the 'competency area', the psycho-motor domain is given its share under 'the performance area' and affective is given recognition under the 'commitment area'.

The discussion document of NCTE referred to in the above section, enlists the following commitments to be developed among prospective teachers:

Commitment areas five are as follows: -

- · Commitment to the learner
- · Commitment to the society
- Commitment to the profession
- Commitment to attain excellence in professional actions and
- · Commitment to basic values

Competency ten areas are as follows: -

- Referential Competency
- Conceptual Competency
- Curriculum Content Competency
- · Transferable Competency
- Other Education Programme Competency
- New Technology and Local Co-operation Competency
- Instructional Material Preparation Competency
- Instructional Material Preparation Competency
- Parental Relationship and Cooperation competency
- Connection with Community & Cooperation competency.

Problems and Challenges: -

Over the last half a century and particularly, in

recent decades, teaching-learning has been undergoing drastic changes. There has been a shift towards student-centered classrooms with the teacher's role more as a facilitator of learning rather than an autocratic master. Unlike in the past when the teacher was entrusted with transferring the contents of the curriculum to a passive audience of students, today new experiments are being tried out in the classroom that includes project-based learning, development of thinking skills, and discovery learning approaches.

Teacher education institutions have been mushrooming all over the State with profit motives until the National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE) with its headquarters in Bangalore, came up with and insisted on mandatory norms and standards for these institutions.

As a result of their intervention, many institutions have constructed buildings with classrooms and procured infrastructure to meet their standards. These institutions were even being forced to increase the salary of teacher educators to the basic amount on the government scale. But later, the effectiveness of NCTE intervention was reduced and the powerful lobby of private education institutions had their way of running their teacher education shops.

Teacher education is based on the theory that "teachers are made, not born" in contrary to the



assumption, "teachers are born, not made". Since teaching is considered an art and a science, the teacher has to acquire not only knowledge but also skills. Teachers serve education, which is an effective instrument of man making.

It is with the objectives of raising the professional status of teachers, developing among them a greater commitment to society, their students, and their profession, increasing their professional competencies and performance skills, and empowering them to face new challenges that the National Council for Teacher Education has brought forth this document.



Now B.Ed. the course is two years course content-wise, academically, philosophically, and psychologically it's good but after four years of the degree, two years is a longer duration. Financially it is costly for the students as well as the teacher education institution. The student admission ratio became less many teacher education institutions are closed. Non-government-aided institutions are suffering from teacher ratio and finance management. There is no substantial research going on in improving the

education or evaluation of the existing programs As a result of all these, teacher education has become close to a farce in the country. The academic isolation of teacher educators coupled with their poor salary and working conditions itself reflects the neglect of the administration on teacher education. It should not be forgotten that the quality of school teacher depends on the training he/she receives from the training institution and allowing teacher education to rot adversely impacts the education sector.



Conclusion:

The teacher is the principal agency for implementing the educational program. The role of the teachers is and will be teaching and guiding their pupils; they have to promote research, experimentation, and innovation. Teachers are to play a pivotal role in extension and social service. They have to participate in the management of various services and activities that educational institutions undertake for implementing their program.

Hope that the Education Ministry will start focusing on the B.Ed. education, where the roots of the education system lie. Improving teacher education would positively impact the education sector as a whole. Thus, most trainees who enter these institutions come out with flying colours.






